On October 27th, 2015, he was able to marry his longtime companion Trase Mac Taggart. Though their paths had crossed before, they found each other

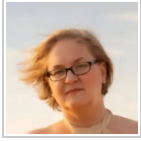

“ Andrew and Trase were here to visit last month so it was especially jarring to learn that he had passed a few days after leaving here. We were each other's first boyfriend in 1989. He looked like a young Mark Harmon with darting, icy blue eyes sneaking glances at me behind the counter where I worked at the local video store. We starred in "The Pirates of Penzance" together, where he played the pirate king and I played his sidekick. He was exceedingly shy and gentle in person, but came alive onstage, throwing everyone off with his fearless performances and beautiful singing voice. Much to our delight, our families and friends did not abandon us for it. Our romantic relationship lasted fewer than two years, but we remained close friends, roommates, travel companions and confidants over the span of 36 years, even after we both found lasting love with our wonderful, handsome husbands, who respected our lasting friendship. I'm so relieved to have had the chance to see him before he passed and reminisce about old times with each other. I don't know where he is now, but I hope he's still*

*singing his soft spoken heart out in the hereafter, taking by surprise anyone who thinks they have him figured out. They say you never forget your first and I never will. I've loved him for nearly four decades and always will.*
