of a kind, outgoing, loving, and especially generous. He had an infectious personality and an endearing Southern charm that drew people in and made them feel seen and valued. He also loved traveling and could often be found people-watching along the beaches of California—a pastime that combined his love for observation with his appreciation for human connection. 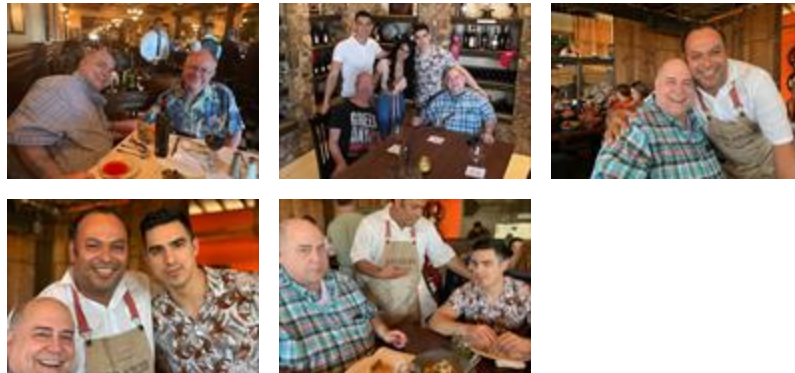
