“ Wendell and I were responsible on our dairy farm near Basalt Idaho for milking 20 cows. He would milk them in the morning before school and I would milk them in the evening. I was 10 and he was 16. He played basketball and football at Firth High School but in order to stay on the team he had to maintain his grades at a certain level that I don't remember what was. English was a subject he struggled with. The cows were his sounding board -- He recited Shakspeare to them in memorizing what he needed to learn for that class. He was a hard worker. He and I hauled baled hay and straw and spread manure on the pasture. We had gravel pit on corner of our farm. We used to haul lots of gravel and sand to put on the road and other areas. He and I and Dad made concrete with those materials to build a silage pit about 30 ft by 75 ft by 10 ft high. He took FFA (future farmers of America) class in school and learned how to weld. He built a go cart and then a motor cycle and had a lot of fun driving those.

He purchased a brand new 1959 bright red Chevy Impala from Detroit and loved to go to the drag races in Las Vegas. He destroyed 3 transmissions doing that and he spent a lot of hard earned money from laying brick. I was his "hod carrier" one summer and we built a lot of block walls and laid a lot brick for new homes. Wendell was a great brick mason but suffered from back problems because of that hard work.
