Lynn Eugene Pelletier, a man of boundless determination, generosity, and love, passed away peacefully on Wednesday, September 10, surrounded by his family.

From an early age, Lynn embodied hard work and grit. As the eldest child of a single mother, he began working at the age of 10 to help support his family. He never cut corners, always putting his best effort in every task. Throughout his career, he seemed to do nearly every job at one point or another—often working 12-hour days—and was consistently recognized with awards like top salesman or employee of the year. He took immense pride not only in the work he did, but also in the people and companies he served.

Lynn's strength was matched by his compassion. He had a quiet, generous spirit, always lending a hand to family, friends, and even strangers in need. He often helped the homeless and went above and beyond to serve others without asking for recognition. He believed in being "fearless in the pursuit of what sets your heart on fire," a motto he carried into every part of his life.

Service was at the core of who Lynn was. After enlisting in the U.S. Marine Corps at 17, he trained and served for four years during the Korean War era. He remained devoted to service throughout his life, taking on many roles within his church and dedicating countless hours to family history and genealogy as a stake family history advisor. He also worked with Parents Without Partners (PWP), where he organized events, service projects, and trips to support single parents and their children.

Lynn had a zest for life that was contagious. He loved adventure and travel, making friends all over the world. Sports were another lifelong passion—especially cheering for his beloved San Francisco 49ers. For many years, he was also an avid and accomplished golfer, winning numerous competitions. Above all, Lynn treasured his family. In his later years, his focus on them grew even stronger. He offered steady advice, encouragement, and positivity to those around him, and his infectious smile lifted many spirits.

Lynn first married the first love of his life, Rosemary Middaugh, with whom he shared five children. After their divorce, he married Linda Todd, and together they welcomed another child before parting ways. Over the years, Lynn's path in life led him to marry Lona Dagmar, Mary Thammavongsa and Aree. In time, he reunited with Mary, and the two shared the final years of his life together. Even in the face of life's struggles, Lynn never gave up. His determination, optimism, and love for others defined him. His legacy of service, family devotion, and joy for life will continue to inspire all who knew him.

Lynn is survived by his daughters, Cheri (Dale) Johnson, Lisa (Brent) Best, Melissa Crump, his son, Lanny Pelletier, and two sisters, Kathy Tsutsui and Edith Acey. He is also survived by 26 grandchildren, and 32 great grandchildren, as well as many friends and extended family members whom he dearly loved.
