With gratitude for his life, Martin Joseph Kaster's family sadly announces his passing at the age of 83. To many friends and family, Martin was 'Jay' or 'Marty'; in the early hours of Friday, May 29, 2026, Marty peacefully passed away at his final home while in hospice in St. George, Utah. Marty's last days and passing were filled with devoted and attentive care.

Born on October 13, 1943, in Green Bay, Wisconsin, Marty was the firstborn son of four children to Martin S. and Mildred M. (nee Bries) Kaster. Attending Catholic schools in his younger years, Marty proudly studied engineering at the University of Wisconsin – Madison and served in the U.S. Air Force stationed in Orlando, Florida with the 1365th Photographic Squadron as a photographer and motion picture cameraman. Making his career in real estate with his 1960's family founded business - Province Realty in Green Bay, Wisconsin – Marty worked with his father, siblings and many dear colleagues. Marty continued his career in real estate in Mesquite, Nevada and made a home there as well.

The sunshine of the Southwest was his ideal. Marty was an early riser, full of energy, he was an active and curious person. Marty would share that he was astonished to have received the years he did, he deeply appreciated these years, at times experienced profound loss and beautifully continued to pursue and value love. What a gift to rekindle a teenage romance late in life and have that blossom into steadfast and mutual adoration! Marty is survived by his extraordinary fiancé Kathryn Selner. Their relationship was abundant with vitality, mutual interest and acceptance; a true full circle, a homecoming and a new adventure all at once. A watchful and attuned person, Marty looked out for his three daughters until his last days, and they him. Marty unfailingly believed in the capabilities of his girls, he trusted them and that was a true gift.
