He was the middle child with an older brother Hobbie and his younger sister Iva. The love of music had him moving from Dunkirk, New York to Orange County, California and an early age.

In the early 60's he used to take us to Knotts Berry Farm where he would play music, rob the stagecoach and work the shooting gallery. He would make sure my sister Tammi and I had our candy apples and feed the seals, He played and recorded music from the 50's to the 70's full time. He was the lead guitarist and singer for his band "The Country Wheels". He was an accomplished singer and loved playing his guitars every day to the end. You can still search for his music today and listen to Mr. Switchman and the Jayhawkers that he recorded in the 60's. In the late 70's early 80's, he went from full musician to part time and then to full-time Electrician at Disneyland, where he retired. He never stopped playing and was always the life of the party.

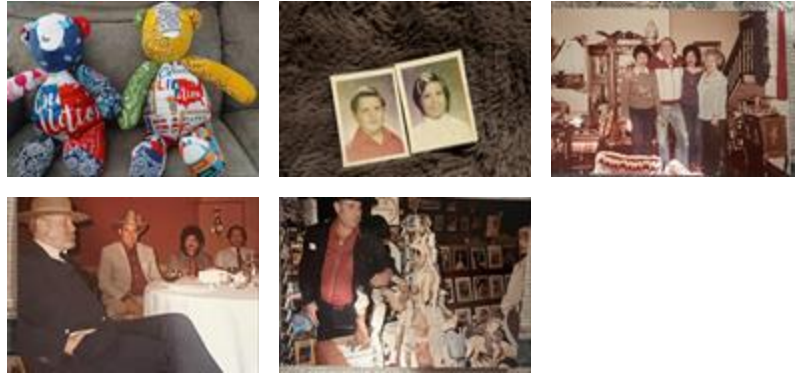
